

Club Coaching Staff of the Year

Pinnacle Field Hockey in Michigan, led by current owner Keely Tamer and an outstanding team of coaches including Nancy Cox, Kristi Gannon, Tamara Durante, Corey Block, Taryn Damm, Abbey Burnett, Emmy Tran, Claudia Keen, Kelsey Chun, Kate Brondyk, and Andrea Shaner, was honored as the inaugural NFHCA Club Coaching Staff of the Year. Since its inception in 2009, Pinnacle has focused on growing the sport of field hockey in Michigan, fostering inclusivity, and developing athletes who embody compassion, communication, courage, and confidence.

Pinnacle's Impact:

- **Expanding Accessibility**: Free clinics in underrepresented areas of Michigan to introduce and expand access to the sport.
- Infrastructure Development: Working to establish a high-quality turf field at the Legacy Center in Brighton, MI, through Great Lakes Regional Field Hockey.
- **Leadership and Development**: Leads Michigan's chapter of US Field Hockey, while mentoring collegiate coaches.
- **Coaching Clinics:** Facilitates virtual coaching clinics through Great Lakes Regional Field Hockey to enhance coaching skills across the state.

Pinnacle's success is reflected not only in its performance but also in its lasting legacy of empowering young athletes. The club has consistently contributed players to NCAA Division I, II, and III programs, with 99% of these athletes graduating from their collegiate careers. Notably, Abby Tamer, an Olympic athlete and Pinnacle alumna, became the first Michigan player to represent the state in Field Hockey at the Olympics.

126 coaches attended one of five clinics offered from July 2024 through June 2025 across five regional locations. An additional 300+ coaches attended the Ready2Coach sessions hosted at the 2025 NFHCA Annual Convention.

537 attendees engaged in virtual professional development programming offered over 15 hours of online sessions.

The second **Aspire Coaches Academy**, launched in March 2025, and *sponsored by* ZAG Tours, welcomed **19** assistant collegiate coaches for a nine-month program focused on professional growth and leadership development. Through virtual labs with content experts. participants refined and enhanced their coaching and leadership skills.

The NFHCA **Redwood Grant**, designed to empower entrepreneurial field hockey coaches, supported three coaches this past year through their aspirational endeavors.

INSPIRING EXCELLENCE COACHING EDUCATION

Zag Olympic Tour



In July 2024, 28 NFHCA member high school and college coaches joined the Zag Olympic Tour, an unforgettable week in Holland, Belgium, and France. The experience blended live Olympic events, international coaching sessions, cultural immersion, and community service.

Highlights included technical training at HC Schiedam, canal clean-up with the local community, and visits to historic sites like the Anne Frank House. Coaches also had the chance to witness Olympic competition firsthand, creating powerful moments of pride and inspiration.

Two coaches, Allison Fordyce (Susquehanna University) and Lauren Scorza (St. John Fisher University), received scholarships, sponsored by Zag Sports Tours and the NFHCA, which covered the tour experience registration fee.

Beyond professional development, the trip fostered collaboration, idea sharing, and personal growth. Coaches returned home with stronger connections and lifechanging experiences. As one participant shared, it was truly "the trip of a lifetime."



INSPIRING EXCELLENCE TOOLS & RESOURCES



OUR VOICEDIVERSITY, EQUITY, & INCLUSION

In 2024–25, the NFHCA advanced DEI efforts through education, programming, and community outreach:

- At the 2025 Annual Convention, coaches engaged in sessions on 'Understanding
 Obstacles in Inclusion for LGBTQ+ People in Sports' with Dr. Anna Baeth and
 'Growing the Game for Athletes of All Abilities' with Able Athletics. Maggie Kutz—the
 first female NCAA athlete with an intellectual disability—shared her inspiring story
 alongside members of Able Athletics.
- In March, NFHCA sponsor ZAG Sports Tours funded a Magic All-Starz adaptive
 clinic in Kentucky, hosted by the Louisville Magic. With leadership from Erin
 McCrudden and Melissa Ponzio, athletes of all abilities learned and played, each
 leaving with a starter stick and ball. The event fostered joy, movement, and
 community connection.



OUR VOICEBRAND & REACH

Promoting the awareness and visibility of our sport, expanding our NFHCA community, and serving as an ambassador of our coaching community with all governing bodies and external stakeholders continue to be key strategic initiatives for the NFHCA. COLLABORATIONSTRATEGIC ALLIANCES







Launched through the NFHCA-USA Field Hockey Strategic Alliance in 2022, the <u>Field Hockey Forward</u> initiative advanced in 2024–25, with a strong focus on expanding and sustaining Division II and III programs. The field hockey community celebrated the launch of **D'Youville** (NY - Division II) and **Penn State Harrisburg's** (PA - Division III) programs in the fall of 2024.

Advisory Committees in both divisions guided outreach and sustainability efforts, leading to direct engagement with schools and conferences. This work produced concrete results:

- **New Division II programs**: Barton College (NC) in 2025 and Dominican University (NY) in 2026.
- New Division III programs: Alfred University (NY, 2025), University of Hartford (CT, 2025), UMass Boston (MA, 2026), and John Carroll University (OH, 2026).

To support growth, the NFHCA published the <u>College Administrator's Guide</u> in spring 2024, providing practical resources for institutions exploring the addition of field hockey. Four quarterly digital newsletters also reached more than 1,800 NCAA athletic leaders, keeping the sport visible and top of mind nationwide.

The initiative emphasized sustainability this past year, supporting new and at-risk programs with mentorship and resources. A virtual Campfire Mentoring Group now connects coaches launching new programs, creating peer support from the beginning.

Looking ahead, an *Operations Playbook* is in development that will include a practical operational guide for newer coaches and programs--set to launch in late 2025.

Advocacy also played a critical role. In September 2024, NFHCA Executive Director Cate Clark, alongside former USWNT and Olympic Coach Pam Hixon and USA Field Hockey Foundation's Executive Director, Pam Stuper, met with legislators to address the implications of lawsuits such as House vs. NCAA and Johnson vs. NCAA. The group, joined by Olympic sport associations and government relations partners, advocated for national NIL legislation that protects Olympic sports and preserves opportunities for student-athletes competing outside of football and basketball.

COLLABORATIONSTRATEGIC ALLIANCES

SportsRecruits



The NFHCARecruits partnership with SportsRecruits continues to drive impactful results, enhancing recruitment opportunities for field hockey athletes. Over the past year, the NFHCA Winter Escape Showcase saw **165 collegiate coaches** from 127 programs generate **7,301 evaluations** of 1,118 unique athletes. 109 coaches accessed the film of 854 prospects from the 2025 Winter Escape event.

From July 1, 2024 to June 30, 2025, NFHCARecruits tracked nearly 13,000 evaluations across three events. This partnership remains a helpful tool in connecting athletes with collegiate programs.

In addition, NFHCARecruits gave the Scholastic All-Region and All-American Committees direct access to nominated players' film.

Andy Whitcomb, Head Coach at Mount Holyoke College and manager of the Richard & Barbara Whitcomb Foundation has made a profound impact on the NFHCA community with a remarkably generous gift of \$9,000. This donation is dedicated to funding Annual Convention scholarships for assistant collegiate coaches, ensuring that more emerging leaders in the field hockey community have the opportunity to advance their careers and connect with their peers at the annual gathering. This marks the third consecutive year of a gift over \$7,500 provided by the Richard & Barbara Whitcomb Foundation.


