THE WHY

Field hockey offers more than just a new sport on your campus — **it is an investment in leadership, academic success, and gender equity.**

As one of the first women's NCAA sports (1981) and a women's Olympic sport since 1980, field hockey combines history, excellence, and global participation.

With more than 6,500 NCAA student-athletes competing across 283 institutions today, the sport continues to present tremendous growth opportunities — especially for colleges seeking to expand women's athletics in alignment with Title IX goals and enrollment strategies.

By sponsoring field hockey, your institution could join a powerful movement to grow opportunities for women in sport, attract high-achieving student-athletes, and build competitive distinction.

The United States Women's National Team competed in the 2024 Olympic Games and is a top contender on the world stage, currently ranking 11th.²

FIELD HOCKEY EXPLAINED

Field hockey is a fast-paced Olympic team sport played by millions of athletes across more than 130 countries.

Each team fields up to eleven players at a time — ten field players and one goalkeeper.

Games are played in four 15-minute quarters, with short two-minute breaks between the first and second, and third and fourth quarters. A ten-minute halftime separates the second and third quarters. Players can only score within the shooting circle, or “D.”

One of the sport’s defining rules is that players can only use the flat side of their stick to control, pass, or shoot the ball — setting it apart from sports like ice hockey. Field hockey also allows unlimited rolling substitutions, keeping the action dynamic from start to finish.

FAQS

How long has field hockey been an NCAA sport?

Field hockey was one of the first women’s NCAA sports, launching in **1981**, with strong AIAW participation beforehand.

How long has field hockey been an Olympic sport?

Women’s field hockey has been an event at the Olympic Games since **1980**.

How popular is field hockey?

Field hockey is the third most popular sport in the world. It is played by approximately **30 million** people in more than 130 countries.

Do men play field hockey?

Field hockey is a highly popular men’s sport internationally, especially in Europe, India, and South America. USA Field Hockey sponsors a collection of men’s teams, including the Men’s National Team which competes worldwide.



COMPETITION GUIDELINES

Fall is an exciting time for sport on college campuses.

Field hockey competition provides a chance for students to show their school pride on the sidelines, an opportunity for institutions to showcase their facilities to parents and alumni, and a moment for everyone affiliated with your school to cheer on a dedicated group of student-athletes.

The field hockey season is fast-paced and exciting. It takes approximately four months to go from preseason to crowning a National Champion. Throughout the season, most teams play two games a week, with conference competitions typically featuring in the second-half of the fall schedule.

Regional rivalries abound and — depending on the travel and division — many away trips can be completed in one day by bus.

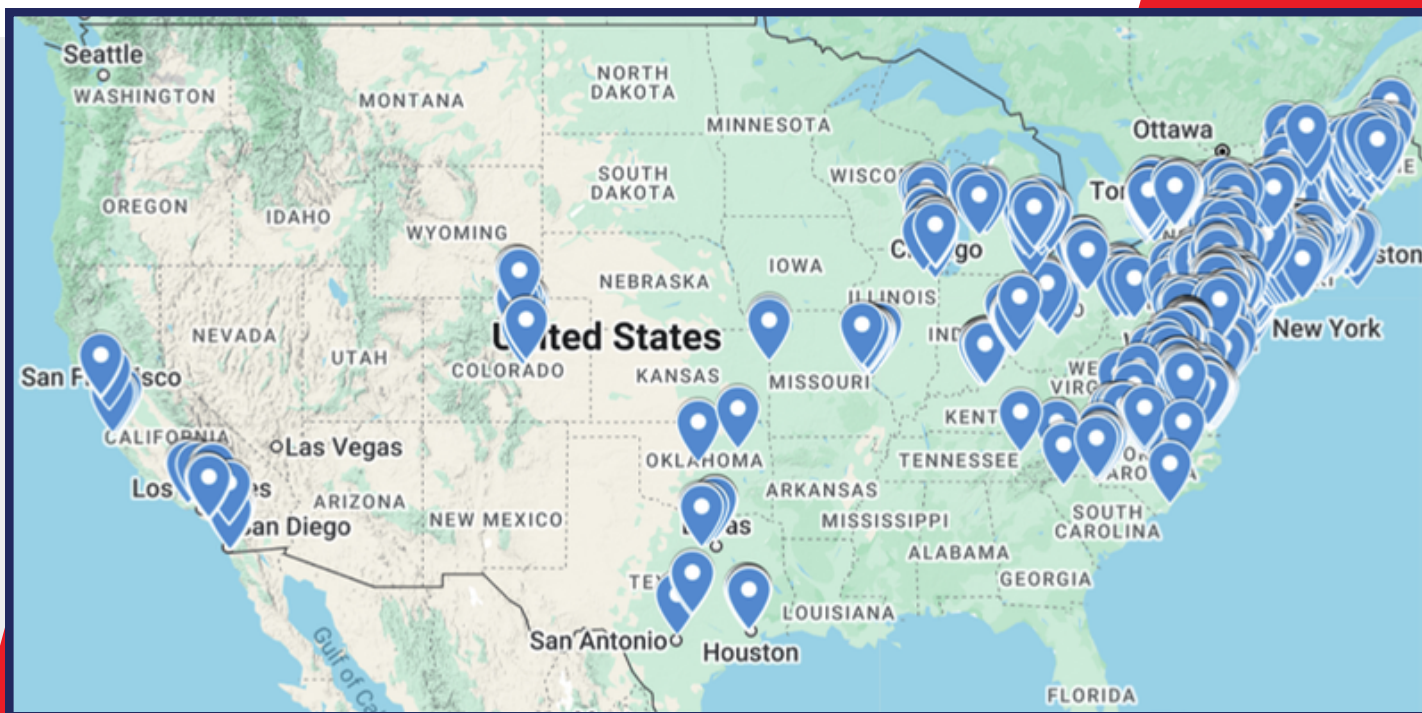

Fielding a Team

Your program will not be starting from scratch, you will be tapping into a robust, established recruiting network.

- **High School** — More than 60,000 girls play high school field hockey in the U.S.
- **Club** — 300+ USA Field Hockey member clubs provide year-round recruitment opportunities.
- **International** — Competitive athletes hail from Europe, Canada, Australia, South America, and South Africa. Of first-year Division I field hockey student-athletes in 2022, 30 percent were from abroad, 17 percent in Division II.¹

ACADEMIC PERFORMANCE

Field hockey student-athletes consistently excel in the classroom, making the sport an ideal addition for institutions that prioritize academic achievement.

With a Division I graduation success rate (GSR) of 98 percent and an average academic progress rate (APR) of 989, the academic track record speaks for itself. Division II and III student-athletes are equally strong, posting Academic Success Rates (ASR) of 93 percent and 95 percent, respectively.

Notably, **half of all collegiate field hockey players earn academic honors for maintaining a GPA of 3.5 or higher.**¹

The sport has also produced **five Honda Athletes of the Year**, further demonstrating the high caliber and well-rounded nature of its student-athletes.

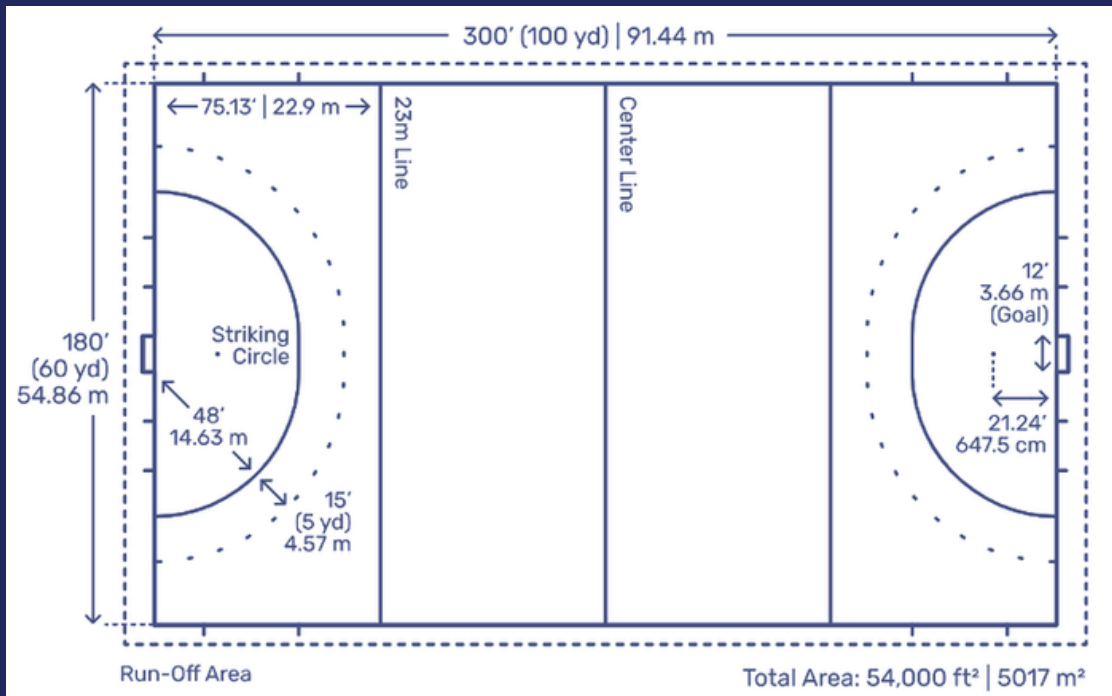

FACILITIES

Field hockey is a highly dynamic sport that requires a flat surface — the most common surface for the game is synthetic turf.



WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW

Field Dimensions

Approximately 60 yards x 100 yards (similar to soccer)

Playing Surface

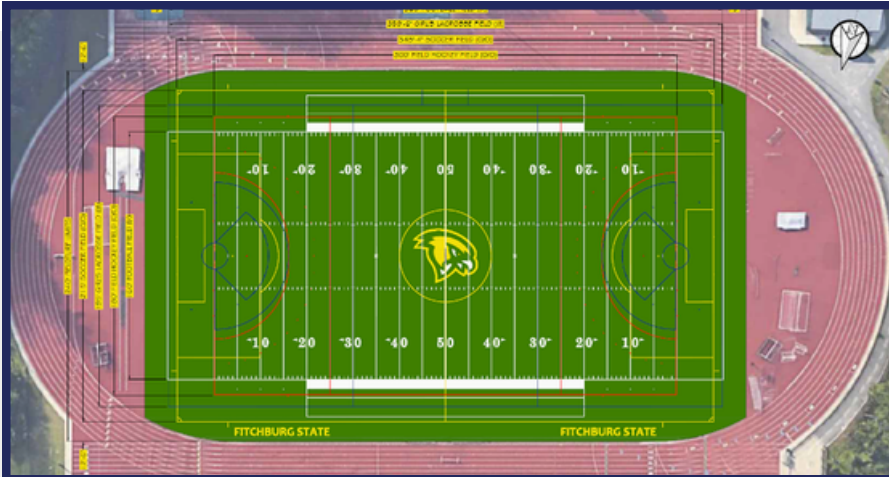
Synthetic turf is standard and water-based turf preferred at Division I, with dry multi-surface turf common in Division II and III.

Multi-Use Shared Field

Many Division II and Division III programs share fields with soccer, lacrosse, or football, maximizing existing infrastructure.

FACILITIES

Benefits of synthetic turf include minimal maintenance and higher durability. It is easy to plow in snowy conditions and provides consistent conditions in wet weather.

BUILDING YOUR TEAM

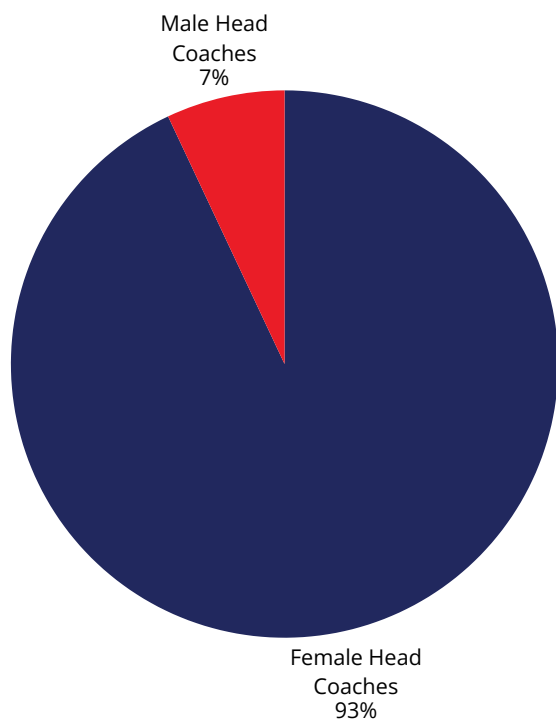
Coaching Staff

Most collegiate field hockey programs are led by women, with **93 percent** of head coaches identifying as female.*

According to the NFHCA's **2026 Annual Salary Survey Report**, staffing structures typically include 1-2 paid assistant coaches, and compensation varies by division and conference. Median head coach salaries range from \$63,400 to \$120,000 annually, based on division.
